Transition of Leadership

As noted separately by Chairwoman Mansfield, I have announced my intention to not renew my contract as President of KCU after it expires in August 2019. After a long season of dedicated prayer and contemplation, I am convinced that God is, even now, raising up His person to lead the college into the 2020s and, though my love and passion for the educational ministry of KCU remains as steadfast as ever, the time is right for new leadership. It is true that the college is doing well by most any standard – our finances are in order, debt is manageable and has been substantially reduced, enrollment is stable, professional and regional accreditations remain without sanction.

So, why now? Because it is when things are going well that a deliberate, methodical, and coordinated approach may be taken by the Board of Trustees in selecting and transitioning to KCU's sixth president. While I will be communicating more concerning my transition in the months to come, it is fitting to make this brief announcement for the sake of readers who might not have received this news via other sources.

A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD OF TRUSTESS CHAIR

It is with great reluctance that the KCU Board of Trustees accepts the resignation of Dr. Jeff Metcalf as President and CEO of the University effective August 26, 2019, concurrent with the end of his current contract.

We deeply appreciate Dr. Metcalf for his 22 years of service to the University and nine as President and CEO. His commitment to furthering the mission of KCU and his leadership during a challenging period in the life of the University have strongly positioned KCU for the future. We respect his decision and appreciate his humility and thoughtfulness in allowing the Board ample time to conduct a careful and deliberate search for his successor.

The Board has begun the Presidential search process with a season of prayer and reflection. We ask you, our alumni, churches and supporters to join us in petitioning for God's leading and guidance throughout the process of selecting the sixth president of the University.

KEERANS HONORED

The KCU Board of Trustees recently honored the lasting impact of its fourth president, Dr. Keith P. Keeran, through the naming of the Dr. Keith P. and Topsy Keeran School of Bible and Ministry.

Dr. Keith P. Keeran served as president of Kentucky Christian University for twenty-two years, from 1987-2009. Under Dr. Keeran's leadership, KCU experienced the greatest physical campus expansion in its history and moved from college to university status. While an expanded set of academic offerings and impressive building programs were overseen by Dr.

Keeran, perhaps his most lasting legacy is that of stamping the institution with academic legitimacy. He has noted that when he was appointed president there were three Ph.D.'s on the faculty; at the time of his retirement, almost 75% of the faculty held the Ph.D. or other terminal equivalent!

Also, Dr. Keeran guided impressive advances in positioning KCU to gain the stamps of approval of both regional and professional accreditors. One of his first major accomplishments was gaining regional accreditation through the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC). Further

accreditations—similarly arduous but focused on specific academic programs—were gained in the areas of nursing, social work and teacher education. In addition to significant academic expansion at the undergraduate level, Dr. Keeran guided the establishment of the University's first graduate programs in 2002, offering masters degrees in Bible and Ministry.

Dr. Keeran, who holds a Ph.D. in communication,

Dr. Keeran, who holds a Ph.D. in communication, history, and religious studies from Michigan State University, served as an exemplary leader in the greater landscape of national and international higher education. He served as one of 77 commissioners, or board members, of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, the body that oversees and makes accreditation decisions regarding around 850 colleges and universities in the southeast. In 1993, he was appointed to a three-year term as one of seven commissioners with the Washington D.C. based Commission on Recognition of Post-secondary Accreditation (CORPA), the forerunner to the Council on Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA) which reviews and gives recognition to

regional, national, and professional accrediting agencies in the U.S. He also served for three years as President of the Association for Biblical Higher Education a national accrediting agency for faith based colleges. He is one of the most distinguished accreditation peer evaluators, having been awarded both the Meritorious Service Award and the Lifetime Achievement Award by SACSCOC.


A true hallmark of Dr. Keeran's presidency is that of pioneering educational work in post-Soviet Ukraine. In 1992, following the recent collapse of the Soviet Union, Dr. Keeran set out to establish an independent college in the Crimean city of Simferopol. What would eventually become Commonwealth International University grew to enroll over 200 Russian speaking students who majored in philology (the study of language) and theology and was at the time the only Christian higher education institution in Ukraine accredited by Ukraine's Ministry of Education. In addition to training students in Ukraine, scores of Ukrainian students have studied on the

campus of KCU and many KCU faculty, staff, students, and trustees visited, taught, and studied on the campus in Simferopol.

Perhaps, though, Dr. Keeran's greatest lasting contribution to the educational ministry of KCU is that he was committed first and foremost to advancing the Kingdom of Christ through higher education at KCU. Through change, growth, and development, his steady hand and deliberate insistence helped preserve KCU's essential identity - preparing workers for the harvest.

I'm fortunate to follow in the footsteps of an educator, leader, and Christian minister like Dr. Keeran and am so very proud to be a part of honoring the legacy of my friend and mentor. There is no greater honor bestowed by an institution of higher learning than the naming of an academic school and it is fitting that ministry students at KCU will develop the art, craft, scholarship, and calling of ministry in the Keith P. and Topsy Keeran School of Bible and Ministry!



KCU STUDENT FIRST UNDERGRADUATE TO BE PUBLISHED IN STONE-CAMPBELL JOURNAL

This past April, Advanced Biblical Studies major Samuel Guy joined several KCU professors in attending the Stone-Campbell Journal Conference at Milligan College, TN. He presented an academic essay for the annual SCJ Undergraduate Paper Competition.

At the competition, Samuel presented an essay on the function of the Greek word *politeuma* (citizenship) in Philippians 3:20 to a panel of biblical scholars. The next day, it was announced that Samuel had won the paper competition.

As the winner of the competition, Samuel received a \$2,500 scholarship to various partner seminaries in the Stone-Campbell Movement along with a stack of valuable biblical resources.



A few months after winning the competition, William Baker, the Stone-Campbell Journal editor, contacted Samuel informing him that his undergraduate paper had been accepted for publication in the Stone-Campbell Journal. This will be the first time in its history that the Stone-Campbell Journal has published an undergraduate paper.

Samuel says he is grateful God has given him such a wonderful opportunity to contribute to the church's understanding of the Scriptures.

He also wants to thank Dr. Scott Caulley for guiding him through the process of writing a high-quality scholarly essay. Samuel's essay will appear in the Spring 2019 edition of the Stone-Campbell Journal.

There is an old George Jones song entitled, "Who's Gonna Fill Their Shoes" with these lyrics:


Who's gonna fill their shoes?

While the Ministry Openings page has a proven track record of connecting churches with potential staff members, it doesn't answer the question of who we are raising up to be the next generation of ministers and missionaries. In many cases, when one church's need is met another church vacancy opens as ministers move from one ministry to the next. Many ministers who went to school in the 70s are beginning to retire. Who will replace them? **Who's gonna fill their shoes?**

In recent years our Restoration Schools have been experiencing a decline of students entering vocational ministry. There are various reasons for this. The culture has changed, traditional family values have changed, church demographics have changed with church youth groups putting an emphasis on the "priesthood of all believers" (No matter your occupation, you can be a servant of Christ. I Peter 2:9) While that is true, there still needs to be an emphasis on recruiting students for vocational ministry. There is no better place to find those young people than in our churches.

So, if you know someone who you think would make a good preacher, youth minister, children's minister, worship minister or missionary, encourage them to enter into ministry. Pray for them and even offer to help pay their way through school.

Former KCU President, Dr. L. Palmer Young was a preacher first. He loved preaching, Restoration churches and preachers. At his funeral, Wally Rendel asked the family for a pair of shoes that President Young wore when preaching. During his message Wally

Flagpole Dedication

at Knights Stadium Honoring the Late Sr. Vice President and CFO Bill Bondurant



On Saturday, September 29, at this year's Fall Homecoming football game, a special presentation honoring Bill Bondurant was made by dedicating the newly erected flagpole in his honor. President Jeff Metcalf spoke about Bill's servant leadership at KCU from 1988 until his passing in August 2014. He pointed out that the flag used during the ceremony flew over the nation's Capital in honor of Bill Bondurant and was sent to us by Senator Mitch McConnell.



Bill's wife, Donnette Bondurant, also shared her heart and love for Bill stating that Bill loved God, loved his family and loved KCU. He worked long hours and made sacrifices throughout his years here. Part of his passion was seeing the stadium built, complete with a flagpole to fly both the American and Christian flags.

Donnette wanted everyone to know that this wasn't a memorial flagpole to remember Bill, but a flagpole that honors him and his faith in Jesus Christ. Because of his faith, Bill is more alive now with Jesus in Heaven. Donette was surrounded by several members of her family including many of her children and their spouses, grandchildren, Bill's brothers and several friends. Jonathan Bondurant prayed a beautiful prayer of dedication followed by KCU Sophomore, Kennedi Meredith, singing the National Anthem. 

Exerpted from Dr. Nash's New Testament Word Studies book

ICHTHUS

The word ichthus means fish and was written on a simple outline of a fish that has become popular among evangelical Christians today for pins, emblems, plaques, necklaces, bumper stickers and tattoos. However, many using the emblem are unaware of the significance and purpose of the Christian symbol of the fish. This was brought to my attention when showing Holy Land slides in which I presented the emblem as found in the catacombs of Rome and explained its meaning. Many told me they had never known this or realized its importance. Many using the emblem think the fish became a symbol of early Christianity because the disciples were fishermen and Jesus had told them to become fishers of men. This may have been a contributing factor toward early Christians using the term as a secret symbol but is not a full explanation of it.

The fish symbol which was used by Christians in the second century as a secret sign of their faith to identify themselves to other Christians is really an acrostic of the actual creed of the church. Each letter of the Greek word for fish is the first letter of the statement accepted and held by all true Christians: Jesus Christ, God's Son and Savior. The acrostic can be illustrated this way:

I	.IESOUS	JESUS
CH	HRISTOS	CHRIST
TH	THEOU	OF GOD
U	UIOS	SON
S	SOTER	SAVIOR

Some religious writers do say that the acrostic significance allowed

the original use of the word for other reasons. One explanation is that fish live in water and the Christian finds his life in the waters of baptism. Another that Jesus fed the multitude with the fish and so it is a symbol of the way He feeds us spiritually.

The symbol can be found inscribed on the walls of the ancient catacombs dating back to the earliest years of the Christian faith.


educational experience she had.

THE JOY OF GIVING BY INVESTING IN STUDENTS

Students at Kentucky Christian University come from all walks of life – diverse backgrounds, limited economic means, various spiritual upbringings, and many times challenging family dynamics. However, they all have two things in common: they want an education and they are searching for God's plan for their lives.

A private school education can be expensive even with the variety of financial aid options available. So, when individuals make the decision to donate funds for student scholarships, it is truly more than a simple donation, it is an investment in the Kingdom.

An example of this is the investment made by the James Gibson Family.

"I am so thankful for the many people who helped me get the college education I needed but could not afford," explained Mr. Gibson. "If it hadn't been for the support of my church, lay leaders, and individual members of my congregation, a college education would only have been an unfulfilled dream. Some gave just a few dollars while others gave more, but the investment they made enabled me to have an excellent career, provide for my family, help advance Christian causes, and experience many successes. The gifts those people made towards my education changed my life and has empowered me now as a donor to experience the joy of helping college students realize their dreams."

One such student is Owens Crawford from Augusta, Kentucky. Owens is a junior at KCU with a 3.3 grade point average majoring in Business Administration with

an emphasis in Sports Management. He is also a KCU varsity men's basketball player. "I don't know how I would have been able to attend KCU without the Gibson family's help," explained Owens. "I never take for granted the investment they have made in me. And, I hope to use this education not only to become a successful leader and coach, but also to continue working for the Lord and bring others to Him."

There are currently seven KCU students who are benefiting from the scholarships provided by the James Gibson family, and all are thankful for the "investment" they are making. "When I lay my head on my pillow at night, I have the assurance that by donating from the funds the Lord has provided me, I am helping to advance His work and His Kingdom," said Gibson. "I am indeed thankful for those who invested in me many years ago and encourage others to invest in the lives of these students."

HOW DO I ESTABLISH A SCHOLARSHIP?

Bill ('62) and Jackie ('57) Brant met at the Kenmore Church of Christ in Akron, OH in 1958. Bill had served in the army in Okinawa. It was there that he got his first taste of missions by accompanying a missionary who took a boat from island to island handing out Bibles. He came to Kentucky Christian in the fall of 1958 and married Jackie in December of that year. While attending school, they were recruited by John Pemberton to serve in Africa. For 31 years they served in Southern Rhodesia (Zimbabwe) and Northern Rhodesia (Zambia) and Malawi. Then they moved to Spain to work with the people of Northern Africa. It was there that Bill had a tragic motorcycle accident in April 1999. Jackie wanted to honor her husband for his service as a missionary. With the help of George Pickens, she set up an endowed scholarship which she named the William "Bill" Brant Memorial Scholarship. It is a scholarship set up for mission and ministry students.

Endowed Named Scholarships are permanently restricted scholarships which are specially named and disbursed according to a donor's wishes. They may be established at any time and when a scholarship fund reaches \$10,000 or more it may be "named" and funds generated dispersed to students according to the donor's wishes. A gift to a scholarship fund at KCU is permanent; that is, the college invests the gift and uses only earnings in awarding scholarships. A gift to a scholarship fund literally lives in perpetuity! 

ALUMNI Spotlight

Francis Nash - Decades of Dedication

On September 30, Sugar Grove Christian Church in Owingsville, Kentucky honored Francis Nash ('71) for his 50 years of service as Minister. He began preaching at Sugar Grove, about 60 miles



from Grayson, while still a student at KCC. Nash is the son of the long-time professor of New Testament and Greek, Dr. Donald A. Nash. Francis married Pam (Treap) in 1968 and together they have two daughters and six grandchildren.

Throughout their 50 years at Sugar Grove Christian Church, Francis has been more than just a part-time preacher. While asking only for

travel expenses in the way of salary, his service to the congregation has gone far beyond preaching on Sunday mornings. He has coordinated countless special events, made hospital and shut-in visits, and often spends the whole weekend meeting needs. His dedication has not gone unnoticed. During the two and a half hour anniversary celebration, tributes poured in from members who clearly consider the Nashes a part of their extended family and realize the rarity of a ministry that spans decades.

After graduating from KCC, Francis attained three advanced degrees. Many alumni will remember him as a part-time associate professor teaching Broadcasting and 20th Century History from 1975 to 1988 and the general manager of the campus radio station WKCC. His full time position at Carter County Broadcasting (WGOH & WUGO) spanned 50 years where he served as disc jockey, sportscaster, and general manager. As a local advocate for "Go Radio" he became involved with the Kentucky Broadcasters Association where he served on the board and later was inducted into the Kentucky Broadcasters

Hall of Fame. He also authored books on broadcasting, eastern Kentucky sports, and local history.

In the early 1990s the Nashes and Sugar Grove became heavily involved in short-term missions which led to the eventual formation of Workers for Mexico Mission in 1995. The goal was to add more churches, ministers, medical clinics, Christian schools, and programs to serve the underprivileged in Mexico. Today Workers for Mexico takes in over \$500,000 annually from nearly 200 contributors to supply salaries for ministers, help with medical insurance, and finance major construction projects all over Mexico. Currently, they provide support for 45 ministers in 23 cities, with more being planted every year. The organization has little overhead as neither Francis, as director, nor Pam, as treasurer take salaries for their work for the mission.

While Sugar Grove, a relatively small country church, has experienced growth through building programs throughout the years, its most significant achievement would undoubtedly be in contributing to the growth of other churches around the world. Under Nash's leadership, Sugar Grove designates 40 percent of its budget to missions and outreach and ninety-four different members of the congregation have visited the mission field at least once. The motto of Sugar Grove has always been "Centered on Christ - Focused on Winning the World."
