

If you are involved in leadership in the local church, serving as a missionary and want the opportunity for additional Biblical training, or have always wanted to study Scripture or ministry in a structured setting, this is a program for you. Even if you have a college degree in another field, consider completing one or more of these certificates to enhance your effectiveness in ministry.

KCU ATHLETES SERVE ON CAMPUS

The men's basketball team energized local elementary schools at a Reading Day pep rally, while the softball team cleaned up storm damage on campus. Football players helped load and unload food supplies in Grayson, and athletes from multiple sports contributed to KCU's Reach and camp teams, all serving as the hands and feet of Christ.

A recent highlight was when athletes teamed up with other campus groups during the annual missions emphasis week held on the KCU campus, helping to pack over 22,000 meals for communities affected by food insecurity worldwide.

KCU Athletic Director David Manning praised the athletes' dedication: "Our teams are always eager to help, both on campus and in the community. Their enthusiasm is truly inspiring."

Since its establishment in 2001, the Yancey School of Nursing has always enabled students to excel clinically and professionally through its ministry. It is a ministry filled with a compassionate and comprehensive focus on the physical, psychosocial, and spiritual care of others, based upon the foundational principles and character of Jesus Christ.

KCU has recently received funding from two grants and a generous donation from a donor that have enabled the purchase of two brandnew simulation manikins. The manikins provide significant practical benefits to our students and enhance their experiences with hands-on, reallife scenarios.

The manikins will also provide valuable training to those who are pursuing a career in chaplaincy. To pursue a career in chaplaincy at KCU, the Keeran School of Bible and Ministry (KSBM) offers an emphasis in Pastoral Care that KSBM students can add to their degree.

ICOM is coming to Kentucky! Mark your calendars for November 14 – 16. KCU will be at Booth 1230!



With the International Conference on Missions (ICOM) being held in Lexington, KY this year, Kentucky Christian University hosted a missions emphasis week in September called ICOM at KCU. The goal of this annual event is to increase interest in attending ICOM in November and inspire students to consider entering the mission field upon graduation, regardless of their degree.

The event kicked off with a great message in Tuesday's chapel from Andrew Jit, 2024 ICOM President. Open throughout the week, the exhibit hall consisted of 13 mission organizations eager to share with students about the short and long-term opportunities available. These opportunities included both domestic and international placements. Students who actively participated in the exhibit hall could complete a passport by visiting each booth and getting it stamped by the missionary.

Thursday's chapel hosted a missionary panel with a discussion led by Dr. Rob Shoaff, Dean of the Keeran School of Bible & Ministry (KSBM). Three missionaries shared about their experiences working with the organizations they represented. One fun fact revealed during the panel discussion is that none of the three missionaries on the stage had a degree in ministry. While KCU is committed to training ministers and servants within the Kingdom through the KSBM, it is important for students to understand that mission organizations also need effective Kingdom workers with specialized training in education, business, counseling, nursing, and more.







KCU'S CAMPUS ASSEMBLES TO SERVE OTHERS







THEOLOGIZE THAT

In today's rapidly evolving digital age, sharing the truth of Christ with a world in need has never been more vital—or accessible. One powerful tool for reaching a broad audience is through podcasts, which allow meaningful conversations to unfold through audio or video presentations available online. In 2023, under the leadership of the Keeran School of Bible and Ministry, Dr. Dennis Durst, who has served as Professor of Theology at KCU since 2003, launched a new podcast titled "Theologize That."



This podcast has become an exciting platform for exploring and discussing theological insights, as well as practical ministry topics, through interviews with KCU-affiliated thinkers, educators, and ministers. Early episodes have featured engaging conversations with Dr. Scott Caulley on the New Testament's Christmas narratives, and Dr. Robert Shoaff, who shared his vision for the Bible and Ministry Department at KCU. Dr. Robert O'Lynn discussed valuable resources for preachers, while Justin Butler, adjunct instructor, shed light on mental health challenges in ministry.

Our students also play an important role in this venture. One episode focused on hearing from our own KCU students as they shared their perspectives on how to reach their generation—Generation Z—for Christ.

Rounding out 2024, we anticipate additional insightful interviews, including Jason Aubry, Head Coach of the KCU Knights football team, who will discuss the impact of mentorship; Dakota Collins, Professor of Psychology, who will offer a faith-based perspective on counseling; and Dr. Les Hardin, who will explore the profound themes found in the Book of Revelation.

Each episode of "Theologize That" is recorded with care, guided by Mike Cochran, Director of the KCU Worship Collective. The podcast is available monthly on Spotify and Apple Podcasts and is free to the public. We encourage you to tune in and join us on this journey as we continue to engage with meaningful topics that equip both current and future Christian leaders.

KCU WELCOMES **DR. LES HARDIN**

After two decades as a Professor of New Testament in Central Florida, Les Hardin has joined the Keeran School of Bible & Ministry. The move to KCU was deeply personal. Born and raised in Nicholas County, Kentucky, he jumped at the opportunity to return home when Dr. Allcorn, a colleague and friend of 20 years, extended an invitation.

Before transitioning to higher education, he served churches in West Virginia, Ohio, and Michigan, and was an elder in a Florida congregation. His journey, marked by both academic and pastoral roles, uniquely equips him to shape the next generation of Kingdom workers. He is excited to contribute to the institution's gospel-centered mission.

One of the most rewarding aspects of his role at KCU is being part of the University's longstanding tradition of training students for ministry and other gospel-centered vocations. "KCU has been a flagship institution within the Restoration Movement," he says. The School's focus on creating an augmented, solid Bible core aligns with his 20 years of work in training preachers, teachers, and other professionals, equipping them with a deep knowledge of Scripture to carry the Gospel into their careers.

Looking ahead, his goal is clear: "I want students to know Christ," he emphasizes, referencing Philippians 3:10. For him, knowing Christ goes beyond a personal relationship—it includes understanding the historical, cultural, and scriptural contexts of the Bible. His mission at KCU is to guide students in developing this

deeper knowledge, laying a foundation of faith that will empower them in their life and ministry.





FROM CLASSROOM TO KINGDOM:

A LEADER'S JOURNEY

After dedicating 27 years to public education with the Carter County Board of Education, including six years as a Physical Science teacher and 21 years as an administrator at Prichard Elementary, a new chapter unfolded for veteran educator, Jason McGlone. In addition to his role as Preaching Associate at Gregoryville Christian Church, in 2003 he took on his first administrative role, which eventually paved the way for his future in higher education. By 2023, he felt God calling him in a new direction.

An opportunity arose at Kentucky Christian University (KCU) that would blend his faith with his passion for education. "I remember asking my wife, LeAnne, to stop by my office. We were so excited about the possibility," he recalls. With much prayer, he sought divine guidance, asking for a clear sign that this path was the right one. Shortly after, a series of events confirmed that leaving public education and stepping into this role at KCU was the best decision for his personal, professional, and spiritual life.

As the new Dean of the Keeran School of Education, he is grateful for the chance to influence future educators in a faith-driven environment. "The Kingdom Culture here is incredible. Our love for God and for neighbors is evident across the campus," he shares, emphasizing how supportive and welcoming the community has been.

His vision for the Keeran School of Education includes expanding the Teacher Education pathways, preparing students to become compassionate educators grounded in Christian values, and providing ongoing professional support to faculty. "My mission is to integrate faith and education, showing future teachers how to lead with love and integrity," he explains.

With a heart for service and a passion for both education and the Kingdom, this leader is poised to leave a lasting impact on KCU and the next generation of educators who will, in turn, inspire students in schools across the nation.

Kentucky Christian University (KCU) has long fostered both academic excellence and spiritual growth, shaping students into leaders who make a lasting impact. Vicky Madden, a 2012 graduate, is a shining example of how KCU's unique environment can influence not just a career, but a life.

Reflecting on her experience, Vicky says, "I was asked to share why I love KCU, but I didn't realize how hard that would be to put into words. KCU made me who I am today. Through the deep friendships and the mentors who guided me, I found a strong foundation for my faith and learned to make it my own."

Graduating with a double major in Biblical Studies and Secondary Education, Vicky credits her time at KCU with deepening her faith and preparing her for a life of leadership. The University's commitment to blending spiritual and intellectual development allowed her to flourish.

Her classroom experiences were as impactful as her spiritual growth. KCU's focus on hands-on learning gave Vicky opportunities for student teaching, classroom observations, and cultural diversity field excursions—an eye-opening experience for someone who grew up on a farm in rural Eastern Kentucky.

With a broadened worldview, Vicky began her professional journey as a high school teacher but soon felt called back to KCU. In 2014, she returned to campus. Her dedication and strong work ethic led her to progressively more influential roles. In less than six years Vicky went from a job in housekeeping to become the Board of Trustees liaison and Director of Alumni Relations.

In 2020, Vicky earned her master's degree in Christian leadership, equipping her with advanced research skills that further supported her work. Her academic journey continues today as she works toward a Doctorate in Educational Leadership, aiming to expand her impact even further.

Vicky now serves as the Director of Assessment and Accreditation and teaches as an adjunct professor for the School of Business and Leadership. "Now, I'm blessed to give back through my work in assessment and accreditation. While my work is largely behind the scenes, it plays a vital role in ensuring that every student receives a high-quality, Christ-centered education," she explains. "For me, it's about more than just maintaining standards—it's about creating the best possible environment for students to grow academically, spiritually, and personally."


